North Country Camps 100th Year - A Recap



The new year began with our spirited annual camper reunion at Chelsea Piers in New York City. We hosted over 120 campers, parents and staff at the skating rink. Fond summer stories, a slide show, and the camp spirit warmed everyone on a cold winter day.

We had a full camp this summer with a total of 164 children. Many were the second or third generation to attend camp. Impressively, 25% of our enrollment consisted of new campers. One highlight of the summer included the construction of a dramatic, versatile new climbing wall and giant's ladder, which was later paired with new low ropes course elements built by this year's workgroup.



While familiar activities continue to excite and challenge our campers each week, inventive new activities are always being tried out, including "Trip Food Iron Chef" and miniature golf in the Cubs' Den. Many memorable hiking and paddling trips occurred throughout the summer, and this year saw two freshly minted 46ers from Lincoln and four from Whip.



Newer (or resurrected) trips included hiking Fordway Mountain (of the Whippoorwill Mountain Club), backpacking along the Northville-Placid trail, hiking various slides in the High Peaks and paddling Lake Lila (resulting in one camper's completion of her quest to visit each of the lakes and rivers listed on the paddling chart). Campers also spent the night in the new lean-to on Pinnacle, which had been built by previous workgroups. A mid-season performance of "Annie" was followed by the County Fair and mixed square dance.

Traditional end-of-summer activities continued with the racing of the Chief's Cup and the Farrington Cup, the horse show, a Pinewood Derby and camper-counselor switch day. This year's Final Banquet themes were "Viking Raid" (Lincoln) and "Camp Trips" (Whippoorwill), highlighting the dramatic skits, creative décor, and delicious food of both camps.

100th Year Celebrations

In 2019, North Country Camps celebrated its 100th summer. Over the course of a century, Lincoln and Whippoorwill have drawn together children and families, connecting them with each other and the Adirondacks. Our camp community now includes thousands of bold pioneers spread across the globe.

To celebrate this remarkable landmark — and the people who have helped shepherd camp to the present and into the future — we hosted a dinner on April 6 at the Hackley School in Tarrytown, NY. Dubbed 100 Years of Stewardship, the evening saw 150 camp alums and family mingle, dine, sing (including Pete and Jan leading us in a song (lyrics below)), watch a slide show (of course!), and bid on many camp-related items in a silent auction. All went home with hearts warmed and heads full of rich Augur Lake memories, confident that the NCC Foundation will continue to sustain Camp's vital and unique mission.

Foundation Update

With the creation of the North Country Camps Foundation (NCCF), we have a board of directors comprised of alumni dedicated to the continuation of the Gucker family philosophy and the NCC experience. NCCF now owns and operates Lincoln and Whippoorwill. We are a 501(c) (3) not-for-profit corporation eligible for tax-deductible contributions.

When NCCF was created, we adopted the following mission statement:

"The purpose of the North Country Camps is to offer campers and their counselors an extended opportunity to live together simply in safe, healthy, cheerful, and yet challenging outdoor surroundings. We believe in introducing children to a camp community where they have a say in what takes place, where life is dynamic and purposeful, yet unhurried, where they can develop skills at their own pace, where they can find their own style and self-worth without excessive competitive tension, where adventure is real, yet carefully supervised, and where learning is the result of participation. We are eager to sharpen children's awareness of the wilderness environment and to work with them in finding sensible ways to preserve it."

NCCF's core responsibility is to sustain and enhance this Camp experience. We are also exploring other avenues to bring our extended community to the North Country to further enjoy and support this special place. Several of our 100th Anniversary celebrations already achieved that goal.

We've had three committees hard at work over the last year. The 100th Anniversary Committee planned all our celebrations. The Programs Committee has been evaluating off-season program opportunities and what requirements might apply. The Alumni Committee has been working on alumni outreach and supporting camper recruiting efforts. If you'd like to get involved please contact Barry Needleman (bneedleman@comcast.net).

NCCF had a successful first year financially. Camper fees covered all the costs of operations. Prior to the transition we actually exceeded our goal in the initial fundraising campaign. We used a portion of the donated funds to complete the transition, and also to make some strategic investments after the May 2018 storm damaged trees, cabins and the ropes course. As a 501(c)(3) entity, NCCF's financial information is publically available. If you would like to learn more, please contact us.

Finally, in 2020 we will be launching a multi-year capital campaign designed to raise funds for large infrastructure projects at both camps. This effort will look beyond normal building upkeep and replacement and instead focus on major projects we hope to accomplish in the coming years. 
Introducing New Families to Camp
